

## **Coastal Wetlands Initiative**



### Why?

 59,000 acres average annual loss in Eastern U.S. from 1998–2004

#### Who?

 Interagency Coastal Wetlands Workgroup (EPA, NOAA, FWS, USGS, USACE, USDA, FHWA)

#### Goal


Reduce loss of wetlands in coastal watersheds

## **Coastal Wetland Reviews**

Examine the causes of coastal wetland loss, successful tools/strategies to address the loss, and gaps that need to

be filled to reverse the loss:

- 1. Literature review
- 2. Stakeholder engagement
- 3. Report summarizing results



# Coastal Wetlands Initiative: Next Steps

- Share tools/strategies gleaned from Reviews
- Coastal Wetland Review Follow-up Actions
  - Currently scoping potential actions to address gaps/needs including living shorelines
- National Ocean Policy
  - Update coastal wetland Status & Trends (2004–9)
  - Complete GIS-based analysis of wetland loss in 4 pilot watersheds & develop recommendations



# **CWR Findings: Living Shorelines**

#### Tools

- Army Corps Regional General Permit
- Model to determine best shoreline stabilization approach
- Shoreline mapping
- State cost-share program

#### Gaps

- Permitting
- Education & outreach
- Incentives
- Institutionalizing models and guidance
- Economic studies
- Incorporating climate change

- Convening stakeholders
  - Meeting at Smithsonian Ecological Research Center with federal and state government, academic, and nonprofit participants
- Coordinating with other federal efforts
  - Connect with SERPPAS, SAGE, EWN, Sandy recovery
- Permitting
  - Compile how LS are currently permitted promote information sharing between Corps Districts
- Making data readily accessible
  - Support efforts to develop data portal
