Y THE NUMBERS



PROTECT

MET protects more than 140,000 acres of Maryland's most treasured landscapes and natural resources. In 2022, MET partnered with four local land trusts to complete 13 new conservation easements protecting more than 1,900 acres in 9 counties.



STEWARD

As part of ensuring the long-term protection of the land, MET takes on stewardship obligations to ensure that easement provisions are upheld forever. In 2022, MET and its partners monitored over **850** easement properties through in-person visits and review of aerial imagery.



PARTNER

MET relies on its partnerships to accomplish its land conservation goals and to steward the more than 1,100 conservation easements MET holds across Maryland. In 2022, MET partnered with 20 land trusts and 27 volunteers to monitor 558 easements.



INVEST

The Keep Maryland Beautiful Grants program invests in environmental stewardship. In 2023, grants totaling \$92,000 were distributed to 31 awardees in 12 counties and Baltimore City. Awardees included nonprofits, schools, communities and local land trusts.

PROTECTING LAND FOREVER

From the forested mountains of Garrett County to the shores of the Chesapeake Bay, Maryland has natural areas and scenic beauty rivaled by few states in the nation. As one of the oldest and most successful land trusts in the country, the Maryland Environmental Trust holds over 1,100 conservation easements conserving more than 140,000 acres statewide.

By protecting your land with a conservation easement: you leave a natural legacy; you improve quality of life; conserve scenic views and wildlife habitat; ensure the future viability of farming and forestry; and preserve the rural character and natural beauty of communities all across Maryland.

Protection of forested areas to protect habitat, sustainable forest management and adjacent aquatic resources.



NATURAL HABITAT

Protection of a relatively natural habitat of fish, wildlife, plants or similar ecosystems.



AGRICULTURE

Protection of farmland to protect soils and ensure agricultural lands are protected.



HISTORIC IMPORTANCE

Preservation of a historically important land area or certified historical structure.



SCENIC VALUE

Preservation of open space for the scenic enjoyment of the general public.



OUTDOOR REC AND/OR EDUCATION

Preservation of land areas for outdoor recreation by, or education of, the general public.



WATER QUALITY

Buffer is required to protect shoreline /streambank, aquatic resources and habitat.

2023 KEEP MARYLAND BEAUTIFUL GRANTS TOTAL \$92,000

Maryland Environmental Trust, in partnership with the Maryland Department of Transportation and the nonprofit Forever Maryland, awarded 31 Keep Maryland Beautiful grants totaling \$92,000.

The Keep Maryland Beautiful Grants program invests in Maryland's environmental stewards.
