


Maryland Sport Fisheries Achievement Award

Captain Bruno Vasta

An officer of the Southern Maryland Recreational Fishing Organization (SMRFO) wrote, upon learning of the prospect of nominating Captain Bruno for this award, "Bruno has done more for fishing in the Chesapeake and clubs than anyone!" This nomination letter will explain why his sentiment is both accurate and widespread.

After earning degrees from Georgetown University and George Washington University in biochemistry, he started his long career at the National Institutes of Health. When the Environmental Protection Agency was created, he was transferred there to identify the chemicals toxic to humans and create regulations to protect the public. Bruno returned to the NIH where he provided leadership within the National Library of Medicine to determine the effects of various chemicals on people. He was instrumental in building TOXNET, a revolutionary online system for disseminating toxicology information. Bruno was appointed a charter member of the Senior Executive Service by order of President Jimmy Carter. He was awarded the NIH Merit Award and the NIH Director's Award for his vision, creativity, and leadership using TOXNET to deliver toxicology data to the biomedical community.

After his retirement from government service, Bruno finally was able to pursue his passion for fishing, especially in the Chesapeake Bay. He joined the Solomons and Maryland Charter Captains Associations as well as the Southern Maryland Chapter (SMC) of the Maryland Saltwater Sportfishing Association (MSSA). Soon he created and edited an SMC Newsletter that was the means to spread valuable information about fishing to its members.

In 1999, Capt. Bruno was elected President of the SMC Chapter, where he helped launch several educational activities to teach children how to fish and to become good stewards of the water resources. One activity was a partnership with St. Mary's County schools and parks that brought scores of children to the Point Lookout Fishing Pier where many Chapter volunteers helped the children catch fish. He initiated a relationship with the Greenwell Foundation that culminated in SMC sponsoring week-long fishing camps where students learn to identify the various fish in the local waters, make their own bottom rigs, and participate in casting contests. The highlight of the week was fishing off one of several boats captained by club members. Capt. Bruno's boat, the Dotty-Vee, always took at least six children for the outings. Capt. Bruno invited charter captains, scientists, DNR policy makers, and other experts to speak at monthly member meetings. In this way, he expanded his influence, create a network of fishermen, and gained the respect of untold numbers of saltwater fishermen.

In 2002 and 2003 Capt. Bruno was elected President of the MSSA statewide organization, the only person from Southern Maryland to be so honored. In that capacity he (1) expanded the organization's ability to lobby the State legislature for laws and regulations designed to preserve various fish species; (2) increased membership to thousands of anglers; and (3) encouraged all 14 chapters to devise their own fishing activities for kids.

In 2003, Capt. Bruno was appointed by Governor Robert Ehrlich to serve as a Commissioner to the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) which sets regulations for fishing along the entire East Coast of the U.S. There he advocated promoting sustainable fishing, cleaning up the Bay, and advancing the interests of Maryland.

Through a partnership with the Solomons Charter Captains he provided leadership for creating artificial reefs to attract and support sportfish. He saw the potential in the debris of the Woodrow Wilson Bridge as it was being replaced by a new structure. The remains of the old bridge were barged down the Potomac River to the Bay where they were deposited to create artificial reefs. This project grew so big and successful that it was eventually taken over by the State's Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to provide professional management and continuity.

In summary, after decades of working for the fish and recreational fishermen, Capt. Bruno is known and respected for all that he has done for fishing in the Chesapeake Bay. Like star entertainers who are so good that they only need to use one name (e.g. Cher, Madonna, and Prince), Bruno is a superstar known all around the Chesapeake Bay simply as Captain Bruno. He would be an excellent choice for this award.

I was involved with Trout Unlimited before I knew Jim, but my involvement in cold water conservation grew and continues due to Jim's personal influence. There are countless other Marylanders who have been influenced to make an impact in the consecration area due to Jim's influence.

Integrity

A man of faith, Jim's tenacity was rooted in his heavenly beliefs. Integrity was ever present, but really just a natural consequence of his faith.

Tenacity

Jim's grip on a Brookie was tender and gracious. His grip on conservation pursuits were firm and deliberate. State agencies and leaders quickly recognized this trait. His love for Mother Nature never faltered. His passion was infectious.

As a result of Jim's passing, several wonderful writings were produced about Jim. I argue volumes could be written. As a Marylander who grew up in the mountains of western Maryland, I am very humbled to have worked with him to further influence cold water conservation in our great state.
