It's Hurricane Season! "Batten Down The Hatches!"

So, you are a boat owner and you find out a hurricane is headed your way. What do you need to do to prepare for the storm and hopefully keep your boat safe from harm?

BEFORE:

- 1. If possible, get your boat out of the water.
- 2. Move it as far away from tidal water as possible.
- 3. Use additional jack stands, and strap vessels to the ground.

What if your boat can't be removed from the water?

- 1. Double all lines, rig cross-spring lines fore and aft, and attach lines high on pilings to allow for tidal rise and surge.
- 2. At anchor Move to the most protected area possible and set multiple anchors. Use at least a 10:1 scope.
- 3. Remove any canvas covers and remove or secure sails.
- 4. Inspect the mooring to make sure it is designed to withstand the load your vessel will place on it. Inspect chains; swivels that connect to the mooring buoy. Double up on the mooring pendant.
- 5. Remove EPIRBs (Electronic Position Indicating Radio Beacons), life rings, throwables, life jackets and any other loose items from the boat and store them in an indoor location.
- 6. Make sure all batteries are charged to keep the automatic bilge pumps running throughout the storm.

DURING:

- 1. If possible, DO NOT STAY ON THE VESSEL.
- 2. Find shelter on land and ride out the storm.
- 3. Keep an eye on the news media to track the storm.
- 4. Remember tornadoes can occur during a hurricane and winds can exceed 100mph. The safest places in a building are in the lowest level of a home, in a bathroom, closet, or basement under the stairs.

AFTER:

- 1. Keep in mind that water conditions may be hazardous after a storm. There may be debris, trees, pilings, and missing navigation markers. There could also be raw sewage in the water. Don't wade or swim to your vessel.
- 2. Water levels may still be high due to flooding.
- 3. Use caution and avoid areas where first responders are working.
- 4. Be observant and vigilant and maintain safe speeds in the water.
- 5. Contact your insurance agent if you have damage to your vessel.
- 6. As always, if there is any distress or emergencies use channel 16 on your VHF radio or call 911.
