

Japanese Shore Crab

Hemigrapsus sanguineus

Identification Boxy carapace with three

marginal teeth toward the front of each side; alternating light and dark bands on the legs; has small hard bubble at the crux of

its claws.

Why is it a Competes with native crabs for

Problem? food and habitat.

Range/Habitat

Has been found in Maryland coastal bays.

Similar Species Similar-looking to the

European Green Crab, but has 3 rather than 5 spines along each side of its

carapace.

Legal Status Prohibited from being

removed from the waters of one watershed and introduced into the waters of another

watershed.

Method of Was first identified on American Introduction shores in New Jersey in 1988.

Was probably introduced via

ballast water.

Control and Do not release live Japanese

Prevention shore crabs into the

environment. Do not use live Japanese shore crabs for bait.
