

# **Walking Catfish**

## Clarius batrachus

### **Identification**

Elongated body that tapers to the tail; long-based dorsal and anal fins and several pairs of sensory barbels; flat, wide head; mucus-covered, scaleless skin; typically a uniform shade of gray or gray-brown with small white spots along sides.

# Why is it a Problem?

A voracious and omnivorous eater, the walking catfish has the potential to decimate local species; carries diseases that may be transmitted to local species.



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### Range/Habitat

Fresh-water dweller; has become extremely problematic in Florida and other parts of the Southern U.S.; has not yet been found in Maryland.

**Similar Species** Closely resembles the native

channel catfish.

**Legal Status** Prohibited from import,

transport, sale, purchase and possession in Maryland.

Control and Prevention

Do not bring live walking catfish into Maryland.

Method of Introduction

The first introductions in Florida apparently occurred in the mid-1960s when adult fish imported as brood stock escaped from fish farms. Aquarium releases likely are responsible for introductions in other states.
