- 1 PROCEEDINGS
- 2 MR. GAUDETTE: For the record today is
- 3 April 29th, 2010. I'd like to welcome everybody.
- 4 My name is Robert Gaudette and I'm director of
- 5 boating services for the Maryland Department of
- 6 Natural Resources and I'll be the facilitator for
- 7 this evening's public meeting.
- 8 At this time if anyone has any cell
- 9 phones, BlackBerries, PDAs, please turn them off or
- 10 put them on vibrate. Appreciate that.
- I'd also like to at this time introduce
- 12 some members of our state Boat Act Advisory
- 13 Committee here, if they can just raise their hand.
- 14 John Bush, who is president, chairman, back in the
- 15 corner. Robin Allison. John Ferman. There you
- 16 are. Ken Kloostra and Bob Slaff. The Boat Act
- 17 Advisory Committee gets involved when we get
- 18 involved in boating regulations and speed limits,
- 19 and I asked them to come here today just to get
- 20 familiarized with the comments that everyone has
- 21 regarding moorings.

- 1 The Department of Natural Resources is
- 2 responsible for overseeing boat moorings for the
- 3 state of Maryland. Regulations for boat moorings
- 4 have been adopted by DNR which establish procedures
- 5 and criteria for the placement of moorings in state
- 6 waters in order to prevent the placement and use of
- 7 moorings from interfering with access to and the
- 8 use of state waters by the general boating public
- 9 and in order to protect public safety and welfare,
- 10 commercial fisheries, and recreational interests in
- 11 the waters of the state.
- 12 With regard to the topic of today's
- 13 meeting, a notice of intent was received by the
- 14 Department of Natural Resources from Hartge Yacht
- 15 Harbor in the spring of 2010 to increase the
- 16 existing mooring field located near the entrance to
- 17 Lerch Creek just south of Chalk Point in the West
- 18 River by 12 moorings to be located adjacent to and
- 19 east of the existing mooring field shown on the
- 20 video display designated by the moorings lettered A
- 21 through L. I should note I believe that the actual

- 1 moorings are located where the anchors are, you see
- 2 the little anchors in the picture.
- 3 The initial staff recommendation made by
- 4 the department was to approve this request to
- 5 register these additional moorings and to mark a
- 6 permanent navigation channel along the most eastern
- 7 limit of the expanded mooring field. However,
- 8 concerns have been raised by the public regarding
- 9 this recommendation. The purpose of this meeting
- 10 is to accept public comment on this proposal to
- 11 assist the department in making a decision
- 12 regarding this request to expand the existing boat
- 13 mooring field. We are not here to argue, we're not
- 14 here to debate, just to accept testimony on the
- 15 proposal to expand the boat mooring field as
- 16 requested by Hartge Yacht Harbor.
- 17 The department will assess the testimony
- 18 provided at this meeting along with any written
- 19 comments that the department receives by no later
- 20 than 12 noon on May 7th at Department of Natural
- 21 Resources, Boating Services, Tawes State Office

- 1 Building here at 580 Taylor Avenue, or you can send
- 2 it to me by e-mail, and you'll have sheets in the
- 3 back that shows that, and I'll have a display up
- 4 here in a little while at the end to show my e-mail
- 5 address, which is bgaudette@drn.state.md.us., or
- 6 you can fax it to our office at 410-260-8404.
- 7 The department will make a final
- 8 decision regarding expansion of the boat mooring
- 9 field on or about May 16, 2010. All oral testimony
- 10 this evening is being recorded by a court
- 11 stenographer and will be available online on the
- 12 Department of Natural Resources website once it's
- 13 available. That will be at www.dnr.state.md.us,
- 14 you'll hit the Boating Services tab, then you'll
- 15 hit the regulations tab and it will be up there.
- 16 At this time I'd like to review the
- 17 ground rules for this evening's meeting. Anyone
- 18 wishing to speak at this meeting shall use the
- 19 sign-up sheets in the back of the room prior to
- 20 testifying. Please note there are forms for those
- 21 who favor, oppose or are neutral regarding the

- 1 proposed expansion of the mooring field. Please
- 2 include your name, address, phone number and e-mail
- 3 address on the sign-up sheet.
- 4 At the top of the podium where I'll ask
- 5 you to come up and speak there is a laser pointer,
- 6 has a little red button on it if you want to point
- 7 to anything up here while we're discussing it. No
- 8 individual will be allowed to testify more than
- 9 once at this meeting. All people testifying must
- 10 state their name. The stenographer may also ask
- 11 you to spell your name.
- 12 The maximum time allowed for testimony
- 13 will be three minutes per individual. You may
- 14 appoint a single person to speak for a group of
- 15 people provided that you identify who you are
- 16 representing. In this case the group speaker may
- 17 have up to five minutes.
- 18 If you are up there testifying and you
- 19 have something that someone's already said and you
- 20 just want to confirm the fact that you agree with
- 21 what someone said, that's fine, you don't have to

- 1 go through the whole three minutes but it's just
- 2 you have an opportunity to go at least three
- 3 minutes.
- 4 All testimony shall be directed to me
- 5 and the court stenographer. All questions or
- 6 discussions with the speaker will be conducted
- 7 between me and the speaker.
- 8 Testimony must be relevant to the topic
- 9 of today's meeting, expansion of the boat mooring
- 10 field by Hartge Yacht Harbor. I will not be
- 11 discussing anything else at this hearing or taking
- 12 testimony on it.
- 13 All members of the public will treat
- 14 each other at this public meeting with respect,
- 15 which means that this meeting shall be civil and
- 16 devoid of any personal attacks, including any
- 17 action such as booing or hissing. Interrupting
- 18 someone's testimony is strictly prohibited. Any
- 19 person who disrupts this meeting or does not follow
- 20 these rules will be removed from the meeting by
- 21 Natural Resources Police.

- 1 Does everybody understand these rules?
- 2 Okay. At this point I'd like to begin the
- 3 testimony. What we'll do is we're going to go with
- 4 those in support first, those who oppose second and
- 5 those who signed up as neutral third. I will tell
- 6 you that any actions that are derogatory towards
- 7 anybody here, to the department, I want him
- 8 interested in the fact this does not help your
- 9 credibility if you conduct yourself in that manner.
- 10 So I'd just like to go ahead and start off with
- 11 those who support the proposed expansion. I
- 12 believe the first person we have is Tom Raley. Is
- 13 Tom here? R-A-L-E-Y? Come on up front and center.
- 14 You have that pointer up there if you need it.
- MR. RALEY: Okay, thank you. Thomas
- 16 Raley, R-A-L-E-Y. For those that can't see, the
- 17 letters A, B, C and so on to L, the anchors are
- 18 actually going to sit and rest to the left of those
- 19 letters. I figured I'd point that out to make it a
- 20 little bit clearer, and essentially the distance
- 21 from that first anchor, A, is going to be 250 feet

- 1 from each dock. The dock that's to the right of it
- 2 at Chalk Point Marina and the dock that is about
- 3 northeast of it to Hartge Yacht Harbor. So it's
- 4 going to be 250 feet that distance and 250 feet
- 5 that distance.
- 6 Common-sense-wise, if you look at one of
- 7 the busiest harbors in the Chesapeake Bay would be
- 8 Annapolis. For small boats. Of course you've got
- 9 bigger ships in Baltimore, that's a lot busier and
- 10 the channel through there is less than 140 feet.
- 11 That's all I've got to say.
- MR. GAUDETTE: Thank you very much.
- Nancy Bray.
- MS. BRAY: My name is Nancy Bray,
- 15 B-R-A-Y. I am the general manager at Hartge Yacht
- 16 Harbor, I'm the vice president on the board of
- 17 directors for the Marine Trade Association for
- 18 Maryland.
- 19 I presume that people might be concerned
- 20 about the disturbance of what you would call a
- 21 channel through this area. However --

- 1 MR. GAUDETTE: You can use the laser,
- 2 the red button to actually point to it. Is the
- 3 laser still up there?
- 4 MS. BRAY: I'm not going to need it.
- 5 The reason I'm not going to use the laser is
- 6 because there is no designated channel and I would
- 7 just like to point that out. Okay?
- 8 This mooring field has been in place for
- 9 approximately 50 years of various shapes and sizes,
- 10 and I've done a bit of research about a lot of
- 11 mooring fields up and down the east coast and for
- 12 the geographic area that you see there and at the
- 13 bottom there's quite a distance between mooring
- 14 letter L and the other shoreline, that's not shown
- 15 on this. Is there a way to move that up or is that
- 16 it?
- 17 MR. GAUDETTE: I think that's pretty
- 18 much it.
- 19 MS. BRAY: Okay. Thomas Raley has more
- 20 diagrams if you want to see the entire area that's
- 21 open.

- 1 This is a reasonable number of moorings
- 2 for the geographic space that is there based on
- 3 other areas. And I would like to point out that
- 4 everybody in this room should be concerned about
- 5 the health of the marine industry and a mooring
- 6 offers a boater an economical place to keep their
- 7 boat, and the health of this industry especially in
- 8 this state is in jeopardy due to the economic times
- 9 that we're experiencing. There are a lot of people
- 10 selling their boats, they're getting out of
- 11 boating, and anyone who's involved with this
- 12 industry or has a boat and who'd like to see it
- 13 stay healthy should consider a mooring as an option
- 14 for a person to stay in this sport if we are
- 15 concerned about economics.
- 16 That's it.
- 17 MR. GAUDETTE: Thank you very much.
- 18 Audience Participant: Is it appropriate
- 19 to ask questions of the speakers?
- 20 MR. GAUDETTE: No. Questions will be
- 21 for you, when you get a chance to speak you can go

- 1 ahead and address that. I think it's -- I'm going
- 2 to give you the address, I can't read it. 4872
- 3 Church Lane.
- 4 Audience Participant: Bob, that's me, I
- 5 don't want to speak. Thank you.
- 6 MR. GAUDETTE: Very good. Mary Todd
- 7 Winchester.
- 8 MS. WINCHESTER: I'll pass.
- 9 MR. GAUDETTE: And we got Buzz
- 10 Winchester.
- 11 MR. WINCHESTER: I decline.
- MR. GAUDETTE: Thank you. That's
- 13 everybody that currently has for support. Who now
- 14 oppose, first is John Pierce.
- MR. SKWRAOEURBGS:
- MR. PIERCE: I decline.
- 17 MR. GAUDETTE: John Pierce declines.
- 18 P-I-E-R-C-E, correct?
- MR. PIERCE: Correct.
- 20 MR. GAUDETTE: Rob Nilsen. Rob.
- 21 MR. NILSEN: Good evening. Rob Nilsen,

- $1 \quad N-I-L-S-E-N.$
- 2 I'm a member of the Shady Oaks Manor
- 3 community and I am also the contact person for the
- 4 Johns Creek Waterway Improvement District. I'm
- 5 opposed to these additional moorings because what
- 6 is going to happen is what Mr. Raley neglected to
- 7 say is that yeah, those are nice little anchors
- 8 there, but unfortunately when you put a boat on a
- 9 mooring you have an anchor and then you have the
- 10 scope of the anchor rope if you want to call it
- 11 that plus the length of the boat. The scantlings
- 12 that Hartge Yacht Yard uses are approximately ten
- 13 feet of heavy chain, ten feet of lighter chain, and
- 14 12 or 15 feet of three-quarter nylon. That gives
- 15 you 35 feet. You add another 40 foot boat on
- 16 there, that's 75 feet. So the 250 feet between,
- 17 you know, the A mark there and Hartge Yacht Harbor
- 18 and Chalk Point Marina all of a sudden gets a whole
- 19 lot skinnier.
- 20 Also, there is a deep section of the
- 21 creek if you want to call it that and it runs from

- 1 approximately here all the way up through here.
- 2 I've lived in the Shady Oaks community for over 20
- 3 years. These moorings here have had a tendency to
- 4 migrate east for some reason. Probably because the
- 5 water is deeper here than it is here and much of
- 6 this area over here is much shallower. When we
- 7 take our boat out, my boat is a 30-foot sailboat,
- 8 it draws five and a half feet. On a high pressure
- 9 northwest wind day if I have to go around these
- 10 boats my keel drags in the mud.
- 11 There is some Code of Maryland
- 12 Regulations that address those kind of situations
- 13 and if you bear with me here I'd like to read them
- 14 to you.
- 15 This is COMAR number 08.04.13.01
- 16 number -- or actually paragraph A I believe it is.
- 17 These regulations are promulgated to establish
- 18 procedures and criteria for the placement of
- 19 moorings in the waters of the state in order to
- 20 prevent the placement and use of moorings from
- 21 interfering with access to and use of the water of

- 1 the state by the general public and in order to
- 2 protect public safety and welfare, commercial
- 3 fisheries, and recreational interests in the waters
- 4 of the state.
- 5 This is COMAR, same titles, COMAR
- 6 08.04.13.02 paragraph B. Moorings may not be
- 7 placed in such a position that the arch of the
- 8 swinging extends into a marked or unmarked channel,
- 9 including navigational main channels as designated
- 10 by the U.S. Coast Guard or in a manner which
- 11 interferes with the operation or of access through
- 12 any bridge.
- MR. GAUDETTE: What does your boat draw?
- 14 MR. NILSEN: Five and a half feet. Like
- 15 I said before, I was out there and did some spot
- 16 soundings and it gets very shallow through here and
- 17 even more shallow right here. What I would like to
- 18 propose to the DNR is a channel that would be, that
- 19 runs approximately through here. That is the
- 20 deepest area of that particular cove, bay, whatever
- 21 you'd like to call it. That's all I have.

- 1 MR. GAUDETTE: Okay, thank you.
- 2 Rob Nilsen.
- 3 MR. NILSEN: That's me.
- 4 MR. GAUDETTE: Sorry, my fault.
- James Granahan.
- 6 MR. GRANAHAN: Granahan,
- 7 G-R-A-N-A-H-A-N. I've lived in Shady Oaks for
- 8 about 38 years now and I really do use the water.
- 9 I've been fishing five times this year for
- 10 rockfish. When I went out last Thursday, terrible
- 11 fog, and it was really hard hovering along where
- 12 the proposed new moorings would be. I took
- 13 pictures the other day after it came in and of
- 14 course to me it looks like, these aren't quite
- 15 right, looks like they're going over further on the
- 16 pictures that I took from what is proposed on this
- 17 map. And also, off of Chalk Point Marina there,
- 18 there's also a mooring out there that really
- 19 restricts the waterway going through there. And I
- 20 do a lot of crabbing, and boy, this cuts down
- 21 recreational crabbing, but I'm really opposed

- 1 totally to this. I can't understand why you would
- 2 even consider it because it just really messes up
- 3 navigation. I don't see any advantage at all. I
- 4 mean I can see money, but still, it's really
- 5 putting a lot of people out that really use this
- 6 water.
- 7 And another thing, in the summertime
- 8 people moor right where it says West River there at
- 9 night and you come up the next morning and you have
- 10 a hard enough time getting through anyway, so
- 11 further restrictions are just terrible with the
- 12 mooring spots. And I'd like to submit these
- 13 pictures that I took and it kind of shows the
- 14 mooring over at Chalk Point Road and it just to me,
- 15 I don't know, are these markings true to form right
- 16 here?
- 17 MR. GAUDETTE: The markings are what was
- 18 presented to the department as to where they would
- 19 be located.
- 20 MR. GRANAHAN: Are they just
- 21 superimposed there? The pictures I took, can I

- 1 submit these to you?
- MR. GAUDETTE: Sure can. Exhibit A.
- 3 (Exhibit A marked.)
- 4 MR. GRANAHAN: Like this one here, it
- 5 shows the following way out. Sorry about that.
- 6 MR. GAUDETTE: Gotcha. Okay, we'll put
- 7 that right on there.
- 8 MR. GRANAHAN: I hope there's no
- 9 consideration given.
- 10 MR. GAUDETTE: James, thanks a lot.
- 11 Okay. Davis Craven.
- MR. CRAVEN: Yes. C-R-A-V-E-N. I'm
- 13 opposed to the configuration that's shown here. It
- 14 lacks -- in other words, in building this, there
- 15 really needs -- you missed part of the picture down
- 16 here to show the connection between --
- MR. GAUDETTE: Go ahead and use the
- 18 laser pointer so I can follow you.
- MR. CRAVEN: Between the area here where
- 20 the last channel marker is and down in here there's
- 21 a channel that people have paid money and

- 1 encumbered their properties to create and it's
- 2 missing in this.
- 3 MR. GAUDETTE: Let me go ahead and just
- 4 put another display up that might help everybody
- 5 here a little bit.
- 6 (Pause in the proceedings.)
- 7 MR. GAUDETTE: This is going to show
- 8 both a nav chart and this, that might help you a
- 9 little bit.
- 10 MR. CRAVEN: Somehow it misses -- the
- 11 channel begins sort of down in here. But in any
- 12 event, this area has sort of crept out over the
- 13 years. And it seems to me that the deepest part of
- 14 the area from the part of the top of the picture --
- MR. GAUDETTE: Hold on one second. I
- 16 think I have one that shows the entire area.
- 17 (Pause in the proceedings.)
- 18 MR. GAUDETTE: I'm going to leave it
- 19 with the original one.
- 20 MR. CRAVEN: That's okay. Without
- 21 seeing any soundings here, it seems to me that the

- 1 access through this area for boats should be in the
- 2 deepest area so that if these are on top of the
- deepest area they should be either moved over here
- 4 or shouldn't be permitted. I mean the first thing
- 5 to me that would happen would be to establish where
- 6 the channel is. And there's the natural deepest
- 7 part of water. The deepest part of the water ought
- 8 to be for the navigation and the mooring ought to
- 9 be off to the side of it. I don't believe this
- 10 shows it well enough for me to be neutral or in
- 11 favor of it without any more information than
- 12 what's shown here. Unfortunately there are no
- 13 federal, there's no charts that show that.
- MR. GAUDETTE: A quick question for you.
- 15 Do you ever notice people navigating through a
- 16 mooring field?
- 17 MR. CRAVEN: Yeah, sure. You do it, but
- 18 like when the fellow was talking about when it's
- 19 foggy, I mean you really would want to stay out of
- 20 there. We go through there simply to take a look
- 21 at the boats. But I just think it's not a good

- 1 idea to start doing that because it just seems to
- 2 sort of sneak across, not that someone is trying to
- 3 sneak illegally, but things happen and pretty soon,
- 4 you know, you're having to navigate through the
- 5 shallower water.
- 6 MR. GAUDETTE: Okay, thank you.
- 7 MR. CRAVEN: Thank you.
- 8 MR. GAUDETTE: Norman Hazard.
- 9 MR. HAZARD: I decline to say anything.
- 10 MR. GAUDETTE: Brady Christian.
- 11 MR. CHRISTIAN: I'm also a member of
- 12 Shady Oaks Manor. It seems that the tendency is
- 13 for the outside boats that moor up to those
- 14 moorings usually tend to be the larger of the boats
- 15 as opposed to this field. My assumption is,
- 16 because as Tom illustrated, it's deeper through
- 17 here. That being said, with the 35 foot of lead
- 18 that goes to the mooring ball, the bigger boats
- 19 have a tendency to run their, I'm going to call it
- 20 a tether line, I'm not exactly sure, but to the
- 21 mooring ball about 20 feet. That already puts them

- 1 into these anchors.
- When you come in and the wind blows
- 3 directly, these boats come all the way out to here.
- 4 With the proposed placement of the new moorings, my
- 5 assumption would be that they would put the larger
- 6 boats on the new moorings. That being said, the
- 7 room for navigation in between there and I believe
- 8 it's Clark's Marina or whatever it is down Chalk
- 9 Point Road would increase immensely. Aside from
- 10 that, it's curious if they've got all this room out
- 11 there, there's no mooring balls out there. Why?
- 12 Because there's an old channel marker right there.
- 13 There's no said channel through this area. At the
- 14 same time, as Davis illustrated, there's a channel
- 15 to the south. We don't have a channel of
- 16 navigation through here and the deepest point to
- 17 get through we're now proposing to put mooring
- 18 balls in and also take I'm going to estimate about
- 19 70 foot of that radius up, which would put you in
- 20 shallower water.
- 21 There's a church camp to the south that

- 1 I was actually a Boy Scout at and we learned to
- 2 sail. On the weekends people tend to come down and
- anchor and moor up for the weekend and relax.
- 4 Well, that alone, it was hard -- I don't remember
- 5 these boats growing up, much less if we put these
- 6 out here. The recreational value of this river
- 7 back here is just diminishing.
- 8 Aside -- there was no justice given from
- 9 Hartge as to what value aside from financial gain
- 10 these moorings are going to bring to the community.
- 11 MR. GAUDETTE: Can I ask you a quick
- 12 question? What types of activities occur in that
- 13 area during the week?
- 14 MR. CHRISTIAN: Jet skis, sailing. A
- 15 lot of, the majority of the church camp goes on the
- 16 weekends with the sailing and you're talking about
- 17 the smaller sailboats. You learn how to sail at
- 18 this said church camp. If you're going to restrict
- 19 more and more you're just taking away the
- 20 activities of the children where I grew up and we
- 21 were able to do so. During the course of the week

- 1 during the summer you'd have week-long camps and
- 2 the West River church camp has these activities all
- 3 summer long.
- 4 MR. GAUDETTE: All right, Brady, thanks.
- 5 Mark Steinlin.
- 6 MR. STEINLEIN: Steinlein,
- 7 S-T-E-I-N-L-E-I-N. I'd just like to say I was born
- 8 and raised in Galesville and I know everybody
- 9 there. I used to work at Hartge Yacht Yard, I
- 10 consider everybody in that family as friends, and I
- 11 really hate to be, you know, opposed, but my
- 12 problem is, as was stated before, when you put down
- 13 an anchor you gotta swing a circle around that
- 14 anchor and you end up taking up almost an acre to
- do that for one boat. And so that water's public.
- 16 How much of a public waterway has gotta be given
- 17 over for private enterprise? I understand the
- 18 exigencies of business and all like that, I
- 19 sympathize, but also there is the issue of people
- 20 sailing in there and people coming in there all the
- 21 time to anchor up on the weekends. You got

- 1 watermen that can't set a trotline anymore because
- 2 of the swing of those boats. It's growing all the
- 3 time and at some point, I know we're not here to
- 4 address it, but there's an issue with the moorings
- 5 off the county pier too. But the whole thing, you
- 6 know, I think we should, everybody should look
- 7 really close at it and while there's not a marked
- 8 channel through there, there is what is known in
- 9 navigation circles as an established fairway that
- 10 everybody uses.
- I am a licensed captain on tugboats,
- 12 I've been in this business all my life and when you
- 13 have an established fairway what you're doing there
- 14 is you are infringing on it.
- MR. GAUDETTE: Thank you very much.
- Mr. Gardner.
- 17 MR. GARDNER: Pass.
- 18 MR. GAUDETTE: Blake Wintermate.
- 19 BLAKE WINTERMUTE: Wintermute. I'd like
- 20 to point out that I use this channel paramount, I
- 21 sail, I boat, and if they put these things here

- 1 it's just going to be jeopardizing -- say if it was
- 2 foggy like you were going in. The deepest part of
- 3 this water is through the moorings that are already
- 4 there. And if it's foggy or it's dark you can't
- 5 see. You could hit it, you could damage your own
- 6 boat, you could jeopardize your lives. And I like
- 7 to think of the channel as -- there's a channel
- 8 marker more down here. I like to think of the
- 9 channel from here up to the next channel marker
- 10 here, and that is the deepest part of the channel
- 11 and if they put these here, then I mean it's just
- 12 going to -- I mean the church camp has people going
- 13 out. Galesville has lots of kids who go out in
- 14 boats. There are a few kids in Shady Oaks and I
- 15 think there are 13 houses in our neighborhood that
- 16 have docks and have boats on them. They go out
- 17 through here all the time. If these moorings are
- 18 here people with sailboats like Rob, lots of people
- 19 have sailboats and we have a sailboat, Raven, she
- 20 won't be able to get through that mud. No way. If
- 21 they put these moorings here we won't, nobody will

- 1 be able to -- it will be very hard to navigate
- 2 through there without hitting someone or running
- 3 aground and getting stuck.
- 4 MR. GAUDETTE: Doug Water-something.
- 5 DOUG WINTERMUTE: That's Doug
- 6 Wintermute.
- 7 MR. GAUDETTE: I can read his
- 8 handwriting, I can't read yours.
- 9 DOUG WINTERMUTE: I should just pass, he
- 10 said it all.
- 11 We have a mooring down about in here and
- 12 I'm concerned that as the swing of the moorings L,
- 13 K and J, if there's a decent swing on them it's
- 14 going to create problems for us and it's going to
- 15 create problems for us and egress back and forth to
- 16 the docks we also use.
- 17 MR. GAUDETTE: How much water is your
- 18 mooring in do you think?
- 19 DOUG WINTERMUTE: Our mooring at high
- 20 water is in about seven and a half feet and we're
- 21 down in here. But when the wind blows out of the

- 1 northwest I can be sitting in the mud and that's
- 2 the problem and we have more northwesterly winds, a
- 3 lot of water blows out of the creek here and out of
- 4 the bay and it's very shallow. As everybody said
- 5 before, the actual channel probably runs right
- 6 about down in here and it's just encroaching on
- 7 decent access for everybody that lives in the Shady
- 8 Oaks area south of the line down here.
- 9 I guess the other concern is the A
- 10 through L, is that proposed, that was given by --
- 11 MR. GAUDETTE: That's what's being
- 12 requested for the additional moorings.
- DOUG WINTERMUTE: So those positions,
- 14 they've created this.
- MR. GAUDETTE: That's the request they
- 16 made, that's correct.
- 17 DOUG WINTERMUTE: That's the request
- 18 they made. It just seems extraordinarily
- 19 inconvenient for everybody else. It will create a
- 20 difficult problem for everybody south of the line,
- 21 everybody that lives in Shady Oaks and I hope the

- 1 DNR denies the request.
- 2 MR. GAUDETTE: Thank you.
- 3 Almost like the same name twice, is it
- 4 Christina Christian?
- 5 MS. CHRISTIAN: I pass.
- 6 MR. GAUDETTE: Peter Bell or Ball.
- 7 MR. BELL: Bell. I'd just like to say
- 8 I'm not in favor of adding moorings. When I looked
- 9 at the charts that I have in this area, this whole
- 10 area is listed as a general anchorage. And right
- 11 now there's just not a whole lot of room left to
- 12 anchor in and I just don't see any real need to
- 13 take up any more space. There's a channel that
- 14 runs along the harbor here. There's very shallow
- 15 water along the shoreline here and it gets shallow
- 16 in this area as well. So for people that are
- 17 coming in that are reading their charts as a
- 18 general anchorage and come back in there, there's
- 19 not a whole lot of room for them to anchor. That's
- 20 all I have to say.
- 21 MR. GAUDETTE: Okay, Peter, thanks.

- 1 George Luongo?
- 2 MR. LUONGO: Yes, sir. L-U-O-N-G-O. I
- 3 just feel this expansion will open up a Pandora's
- 4 box. It's a public waterway and one should not
- 5 monopolize the waterways. Commercial fishermen
- 6 need it for trotlining, eeling and gill netting.
- 7 You've already lost considerable oyster bottom, we
- 8 need to maintain the rest of our bottom. It's also
- 9 a hazard to recreational crabbers. I pay slip rent
- 10 year round. \$200,000 boats can't afford to get a
- 11 slip. That's all.
- MR. GAUDETTE: Okay, George.
- Bob Evans down on the farm.
- 14 MR. EVANS: Bob Evans down on the water.
- 15 Thank you very much for letting me speak here
- 16 today. I'm Bob Evans, the president of the Anne
- 17 Arundel County Watermen's Association, and I'm the
- 18 second vice president of the Maryland Watermen's
- 19 Association and I'm here representing not only Anne
- 20 Arundel County watermen but watermen from all over
- 21 the state, and I want to talk to you about

- 1 harvestable waters.
- 2 It's getting to be a problem all over
- 3 the state, not only in West River or Annapolis or
- 4 Anne Arundel County but all over the state with the
- 5 mooring buoys. With the economic times it's
- 6 becoming much more popular. The watermen's
- 7 association is opposed to it, not because we're
- 8 opposed to boats. We are opposed to harvestable
- 9 waters. Now, you take this area here from time to
- 10 time is very productive for crabbing, gill net
- 11 fishing, eeling, and every time you put a mooring
- 12 buoy someplace that's a lot of territory that we
- 13 lose, and we can't afford to lose any more
- 14 territory. We're struggling. And we have just as
- 15 much right to work that water as they do to put a
- 16 boat there. And actually I believe that there's
- 17 going to be legislation next year put in to do
- 18 something about the problem with the mooring buoys.
- 19 So the watermen having nothing against the boats or
- 20 anybody that has it, we just need the areas to
- 21 work. Thank you very much.

- 1 MR. GAUDETTE: Thank you.
- John Martini.
- MR. MARTINI: My name's John Martini and
- 4 I purchased Shady Oaks Marina in January of this
- 5 year. And I've actually been boating on the West
- 6 River since 1971 when my father purchased it from
- 7 the Gunther family. And so there's no question in
- 8 my mind that there's a natural channel that runs
- 9 through there, runs through here. I've been
- 10 boating there as a boy and adult for the better
- 11 part of 40 years, maybe it's more than that. But,
- 12 you know. So we as boaters feel, sailors feel like
- 13 there's a distinct channel there and we surely
- 14 would like to know from DNR's perspective what they
- 15 think about it. As I said, I basically leveraged
- 16 and took everything I owned to buy Shady Oaks
- 17 Marina and right now it's a struggle to make it go
- 18 because of the economy, number one, and because the
- 19 people that owned it prior to that did some
- 20 different things.
- 21 But the point is, is that we're trying

- 1 to generate business to fill the marina and to
- 2 have, anybody have to navigate around these
- 3 sailboats is going to be a big problem for my
- 4 livelihood as well as it's only going to cause
- 5 conflict. In a day and age that we should probably
- 6 not be looking at something that's excessive, I
- 7 mean just look at that, that's excessive. I mean
- 8 you're definitely crowding the whole waterway
- 9 there. And, you know, it should be looked at a lot
- 10 longer and harder than it has been to have this
- 11 meeting at the end of it and we're scrambling to
- 12 try to figure out if we should or shouldn't. I'm
- 13 not so much not in favor of it if it didn't impact
- 14 the channel, but I truly believe it does. If it
- 15 didn't, then it wouldn't be such a big deal because
- 16 we can take a little bit more time and go around
- 17 it. But I'm pretty much convinced that it does, it
- 18 impacts me, my livelihood and the livelihood of a
- 19 lot of people in this room.
- 20 MR. GAUDETTE: Now, you mainly have
- 21 motorboats in Shady Oaks.

- 1 MR. MARTINI: Yes.
- 2 MR. GAUDETTE: Do they go through the
- 3 mooring field or do they tend to go around it?
- 4 MR. MARTINI: We try to go around it.
- 5 It's kind of hard to weave your way through it.
- 6 You go around if you can. If you go through it you
- 7 end up, you know, a little bit at odds with the
- 8 people that are there and ducking and they're
- 9 giving you the high hard one and you're looking at
- 10 them, and I don't want it to be uncomfortable for
- 11 the customers coming in and out of there. That's
- one selfish reason. The other one is I want my
- 13 kids to grow up on the water and be able to work
- 14 their way and sail and fish and crab in that area
- 15 without having, you know, it totally clogged up
- 16 with moorings.
- 17 MR. GAUDETTE: Okay, John, great. Thank
- 18 you.
- J.R. Gross.
- 20 MR. GROSS: Good evening. I appreciate
- 21 you giving me this opportunity to speak here. I'm

- 1 here in two capacities, one I'm a commercial
- 2 waterman, I live on South Creek, and the other one
- 3 I operate a pile driver rig. And this is the
- 4 channel. I operate about a 60 by 25 foot wide rig.
- 5 I just went up to Plantation Boulevard to do a pier
- 6 there, and to tow a rig in here, a pile driver in
- 7 here is almost impossible and it would definitely
- 8 be impossible if you put more moorings here. Lord
- 9 forbid one of these boats in here would sink and I
- 10 would have to come in there and try to get it up
- 11 with that rig because it's impossible.
- 12 As a commercial fisherman we trotline in
- 13 this channel, eight years ago a sailboat anchored
- 14 here 2 o'clock in the morning and I struck it. So
- 15 \$10,000 out of my pocket that I had to pay for this
- 16 sailboat that was anchored here. So that's another
- 17 problem.
- 18 This shore here, I mean you can see this
- 19 was a very good area for us to trotline. You can't
- 20 trotline that now because as you work that line in
- 21 the course of the day it sweeps out. Well, there

- 1 you go, you're sweeping into this boat here. I
- 2 can't even get up here. I can't get in here with
- 3 that rig. I can't get that rig up to here, so all
- 4 these people up here can't get any work done. I'm
- 5 not saying they can't because people have smaller
- 6 rigs than I, but you get it blowing 10 or 15 miles
- 7 an hour and trying to navigate this is ridiculous,
- 8 you know. As far as I'm concerned, I was looking
- 9 for it to be reduced, the mooring field, and not
- 10 increased. That's all I have to say. I do oppose
- 11 it.
- MR. GAUDETTE: Thank you.
- P.D. somebody. Can't read it. 3831
- 14 Shady Oaks Road.
- MR. LANGELIER: I just pretty much --
- 16 Langelier, L-A-N-G-E-L-I-E-R. I've lived here
- 17 since 1995, and again, there's very little room and
- 18 I don't think anybody has even said anything about
- 19 the boats that the church camp moor outside of
- 20 their area as well. So I mean there's little room
- 21 to get through there as it is, and as I think a few

- 1 people have expressed earlier, once you drop the
- 2 mooring and then the length of your pennant and the
- 3 length of your boat and the swing, it really, given
- 4 the direction of the wind, can really hamper your
- 5 getting in and out. So again I'm totally opposed
- 6 to it and hope you all see it the right way.
- 7 MR. GAUDETTE: Okay, thank you.
- 8 Marcie.
- 9 MS. LANGELIER: Same last name,
- 10 L-A-N-G-E-L-I-E-R. And I'm also, Paul and I are
- 11 both residents of Shady Oaks Manor and I just have
- 12 a few things I want to say. One is some of the
- 13 stuff that I do professionally is safety assessment
- 14 for naval aviation and in my line of work what we
- 15 call this is increasing your exposure to a risk.
- 16 That's the way I look at it. Once you increase
- 17 your exposure to a risk your likelihood of that
- 18 incident happening goes up. And what I see is
- 19 increasing our exposure to a risk, especially as
- 20 Blake was talking about, when you're in a kayak,
- 21 which I have experienced going out in a kayak, it's

- 1 scary. You have to go in and out and you can't
- 2 tell when someone can see you or not as it is. I
- 3 think this is definitely a navigational hazard to
- 4 add more moorings. It's very hard to navigate
- 5 already at night in the fog and other conditions
- 6 and it's making that more hazardous.
- 7 I'd also like to see the data that was
- 8 mentioned earlier from the Hartges that would tell
- 9 us why this geographic area is, any other
- 10 geographic area on the east coast or anywhere else
- 11 is relevant to the specifics that we're talking
- 12 about, this West River area and the surrounding
- 13 creeks. I don't understand how that is an argument
- 14 at all. It's a specific area unlike other areas
- 15 that can be compared to it. I also don't
- 16 understand why, if there's less boaters in this
- 17 economic time, why we need to have more moorings.
- 18 Just does not make sense to me. It's not logical.
- 19 And I don't know how having more moorings is a
- 20 positive let alone the environmental impact.
- 21 MR. GAUDETTE: Thanks. That's the end

- 1 of our initial opposed list. Now we have the
- 2 neutral list, and a lot of people that signed up
- 3 for the neutral list didn't quite know what the
- 4 proposal was, so they may give a neutral position
- 5 or they may give opposed or they may give support.
- 6 If you're going to say something different than
- 7 neutral, let us know when you come up. Jeff Smith.
- 8 MR. SMITH: I'll pass.
- 9 MR. GAUDETTE: Bob Gallagher.
- 10 MR. GALLAGHER: Bob Gallagher,
- 11 G-A-L-L-A-G-H-E-R. I live in Shady Side and I'm
- 12 with the West-Rhodes Riverkeeper organization.
- 13 Hartge Yacht Harbor has legitimate, important
- 14 economic interests in expanding its business. The
- 15 watermen have a legitimate economic interest in
- 16 protecting the harvestable bottom. You've heard
- 17 from a large number of people in the community
- 18 about their interests that are impacted by this.
- 19 Whatever you decide, whether to grant the
- 20 permission or deny it, someone's interests are
- 21 going to be disappointed and that doesn't have to

- 1 be the case. And we're only having this discussion
- 2 because Hartge's applied for permission to do this.
- 3 There are a lot of moorings going in
- 4 down there every week without anyone applying for
- 5 permission that are interfering with the interests
- 6 you've heard about, interfering with the efforts of
- 7 the watermen to harvest crabs and fish.
- 8 West-Rhodes Riverkeeper has asked DNR in
- 9 the past consistent with DNR's authority under the
- 10 law to establish a regime for regulating moorings,
- 11 where they would be, how many there can be, and you
- 12 turned us down. We asked you again to establish a
- 13 regime that where you could delegate it to
- 14 nonprofit groups like us and you turned us down.
- 15 You sent us to the county and the county said they
- 16 talked to you and you told them you weren't
- 17 interested in delegating to the county. I don't
- 18 know if that's true or not, but I know that you
- 19 turned us down. I think that's an idea that you
- 20 ought to reconsider, because these interests that
- 21 you've heard about can be accommodated in a

- 1 rational regulatory scheme for moorings and we
- 2 won't have to go through this again. So I ask you
- 3 to reconsider that decision.
- 4 MR. GAUDETTE: Thanks, Bob. Kathy
- 5 Gillis.
- 6 MS. GILLIS: Pass.
- 7 MR. GAUDETTE: Charles Gibbs.
- 8 MR. GIBBS: I'll pass.
- 9 MR. GAUDETTE: Donna Schlegel? Donna.
- 10 MS. SCHLEGEL: Yes. S-C-H-L-E-G-E L.
- 11 Thank you for including all of us here
- 12 tonight, appreciate the opportunity.
- 13 I recently did a fairly good sounding of
- 14 Shady Oaks and the mooring fields primarily in the
- 15 area that I felt was impeding on Shady Oaks and
- 16 they, they're accustomed to having six and a half
- 17 feet at mean low water access in and out of their
- 18 channel, and what I did find was the lower moorings
- 19 in the mooring field were just about that or
- 20 slightly less than six and a half feet. It would
- 21 be the bottom four to five moorings. And the

- 1 additional two that are proposed would place those
- 2 moorings in even shallower water, so that would be
- 3 a difficult access for Shady Oaks.
- 4 I'm the managing partner of Chalk Point
- 5 Marine, a very small marina over on the peninsula.
- 6 When I received permits ten years ago to rebuild
- 7 the facility, the piers actually extended further
- 8 westward than they, than what you see now. I was
- 9 restricted to only constructing out to that, to
- 10 those Ts because there was a designated channel
- 11 that was determined by our engineers, the tech
- 12 group, and the county. I do have a copy here so I
- 13 would be more than happy to leave that with you.
- MR. GAUDETTE: Exhibit B.
- 15 (Exhibit B marked.)
- MS. SCHLEGEL: Just recently I placed a
- 17 temporary mooring to show where the 100-foot
- 18 setback is. The 100-foot setback designates the
- 19 eastern side of the channel, so according to the
- 20 county, and I realize that DNR has precedence over
- 21 the county as far as determining where the channels

- 1 lie, the county had determined that the designated
- 2 channel east side was 100 feet off the Ts. If the
- 3 channel is moved over, then it does encroach more
- 4 so on the eastern side, onto the Chalk Point side,
- 5 and it would be not impossible but the egress would
- 6 be affected.
- 7 MR. GAUDETTE: Okay. Genevieve Johnson.
- 8 MS. JOHNSON: I decline.
- 9 MR. GAUDETTE: Okay. Alex Schlegel.
- 10 MR. SCHLEGEL: That's S-C-H-L-E-G-E-L.
- 11 My wife just spoke. We own Chalk Point Marine and
- 12 the length of this T head right here is about 100
- 13 feet long, so that 100-foot setback you can see is
- 14 about in there. Right in this area is a shoal. If
- 15 you have a six-foot draft boat you have to go out
- 16 to about that spot to clear it. And also if you
- 17 have a sailboat you can usually see it coming but
- if you have a powerboat and you're coming out
- 19 through here a guy going by the channel can't see
- 20 you coming out and the guy in here can't see the
- 21 guy coming by. So the channel shouldn't run in too

- 1 close to avoid collisions.
- I used to run Hartge Yacht Yard and you
- 3 had to watch it as you're coming out these,
- 4 watching the traffic going by. It's something to
- 5 consider in the whole scheme of things here.
- 6 Down here at the church camp, the guys
- 7 that are sailing there, usually they're during the
- 8 week, they're learning to sail and they need all
- 9 the room they can get. They kind of struggle
- 10 getting back and forth. On the other hand, West
- 11 River is a great place to have a boat. The people
- 12 that come from all over contribute to the economy
- 13 in a great way. They spend money on restaurants,
- 14 gas stations, benefit many ways, plus they get to
- 15 be on the water. It's a good experience for them,
- 16 good experience for their kids. So there's lots of
- 17 reasons to have moorings somewhere to give people
- 18 access to the water, but we also would like to work
- 19 with the watermen and everyone else who has an
- 20 interest there.
- 21 MR. GAUDETTE: Okay, thank you very

- 1 much.
- 2 Mark Cross.
- 3 MR. CROSS: I pass.
- 4 MR. GAUDETTE: Mike Lofton.
- 5 MR. LOFTON: L-O-F-T-O-N. I'm a
- 6 customer of Mr. Martini, I have the smallest boat
- 7 in his marina, by far the smallest boat. I've been
- 8 at Shady Oaks for about 20 years and I'm an old
- 9 retired guy and I fish, I love it. I go through
- 10 here probably a hundred, hundred fifty times a year
- 11 in a lot of different conditions and I think John
- 12 really said it well, common sense, look at this,
- 13 this is a commercial facility. This will be
- 14 privatizing the public waterways. All you have to
- 15 do is look at it. The general public user is going
- 16 to be forced over, probably not be able to function
- 17 at all, the kids at the church camp, the crabbers,
- 18 the recreational fisherman. I'm a customer of Mr.
- 19 Evans. I'm not nearly as good a fisherman as he is
- 20 so I go to his place pretty often. It's amazing to
- 21 me that the public waterway is already so

- 1 commercialized, that it would even be more so. I
- 2 think you need to consider that.
- The adequacy of shoreside facilities, I
- 4 haven't heard any discussion about that, I can't
- 5 find any reference, whether or not there's parking,
- 6 bathrooms, all those kinds of things that would
- 7 support yet more use out there. I know there's at
- 8 least one live-aboard out there all the time. I'm
- 9 not sure how that would work here.
- 10 The transient boater issue is a real
- 11 significant one because many of those people do not
- 12 run anchor lights at night and occasionally I'll
- 13 get caught in bad weather and I'm coming in in the
- 14 dark, I'm coming in in the rain, and it's very
- 15 difficult to come through as is, and you really
- 16 have to watch for the transients and you just
- 17 create more congestion, there's more hazard. It
- 18 seems a poor choice to me.
- I moved from neutral to opposed by the
- 20 way, as I listened and learned here this evening.
- 21 The comparison to Annapolis, I think it's apt. In

- 1 Annapolis you can't sail around in little boats in
- 2 the harbor area, you can't crab, you can't
- 3 waterski, you can't do any of those things it's
- 4 become so commercialized and this really would I
- 5 think be the breaking point that would convert this
- 6 to a purely commercial facility and limit the
- 7 general public's use.
- 8 And as to the economics, the idea of
- 9 adding supply into a market that is already glutted
- 10 with excess supply makes little economic sense.
- 11 It's sort of how we got to where we are in housing
- 12 and I think for the state to do things to induce
- 13 further supply is just going to hurt existing
- 14 operators that are competing for a small and sadly
- 15 shrinking market. I think you enable some others
- 16 and I think Mr. Martini would be particularly
- 17 handicapped trying to compete with this, blocking
- 18 the channel and offering more supply in this
- 19 market. Those are my comments. Thank you.
- 20 MR. GAUDETTE: Thank you, Mike. Amelia
- 21 Whitman.

- 1 MS. WHITMAN: I pass.
- 2 MR. GAUDETTE: Elsie Whitman.
- 3 MS. WHITMAN: I pass.
- 4 MR. GAUDETTE: Don Fegley.
- 5 MR. FEGLEY: Pass.
- 6 MR. GAUDETTE: That is everyone I have
- 7 currently signed up. Is there anyone else at this
- 8 point in time that would want to be on one of these
- 9 lists that is not who would like to testify?
- 10 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, I didn't sign up. My
- 11 name is Clarence Johnson.
- MR. GAUDETTE: Are you opposed, neutral?
- MR. JOHNSON: I'm opposed. I'm opposed
- 14 to the new moorings. I'm a member of Shady Oaks,
- 15 been here for 41 years. When I moved down here you
- 16 could look from the point -- where is the
- 17 pointer? -- you could look from here clean on out
- 18 the river at a clear shot. There was none of these
- 19 moorings here, there was a few sailboats here.
- 20 MR. GAUDETTE: Clarence, when was that?
- MR. JOHNSON: Probably about 30 years

- 1 ago. You could look from here straight out, look
- 2 clean out the river. There was no problem
- 3 whatsoever, no sailboats or anything. There were a
- 4 few right in here and that was about it. Right now
- 5 there's about 75 moorings out there, there's 262
- 6 boat slips at the marina not counting what's
- 7 underneath the shed. There's probably 30 or 40
- 8 under there. So you're looking at almost 500 boat
- 9 slips out there. I don't see how 2 percent or so
- 10 is going to help them in their economy as far as
- 11 doing that when they're taking away from the marina
- 12 that's up in here, you're taking away from all the
- 13 communities around the area getting out of the
- 14 river. In the summertime this area right here is
- 15 just full of sailboats that transient. They like
- 16 to come up here and anchor for a week. You come up
- 17 here at night, it's very dangerous, you can't get
- in through here without going through the
- 19 sailboats. There's no designated channel anywhere
- 20 in through here that's marked. Its like a big, I
- 21 don't know, free-for-all in there. It's very

- 1 dangerous.
- Like I say, I know one gentleman, a
- 3 commercial crabber, two years ago hit one of them
- 4 in here because he couldn't turn his boat around.
- 5 The commercial crabbers come in here 4, 5 o'clock
- 6 in the morning, they go in there to set their
- 7 trotlines, all of a sudden whammo, you got a half a
- 8 dozen boats on your line. What are they going to
- 9 do, turn around and take the trotline back up?
- 10 That's a joke. I run a trotline, but I'm just a --
- 11 I only need a couple dozen crabs for myself, and
- 12 there's people crab here, they crab along here,
- 13 they crab up and down through here, they crab in
- 14 this creek here and it's just, I can't understand
- 15 why you're going to put a half a dozen or a dozen
- 16 more buoys in here to just let somebody else have a
- 17 little bit more economy and take away from
- 18 everybody else in the community. Thanks very much.
- MR. GAUDETTE: Thanks, Clarence. Is
- 20 that it? Okay. Again, the record's going to
- 21 remain open for written comments. Now, obviously

- 1 if someone indicated something that you don't agree
- 2 with and you want to send some written comments in,
- 3 that's fine. The more information the better.
- 4 Again, it's until noon on May 7th and about a week
- 5 later I'll be going ahead and making a
- 6 determination. I've asked the stenographer to try
- 7 and get a transcript available within a week, which
- 8 I'll post online. And I certainly appreciate
- 9 everybody's comments, those both in favor, opposed,
- 10 and those who just gave general comments. The
- 11 department takes the matters regarding stewardship
- 12 of the waterways very seriously. I think that this
- 13 information has been very helpful to me, and again,
- 14 I appreciate all your cooperation and your patience
- 15 listening to everybody speak and your excellent
- 16 demeanor tonight during this meeting. And with
- 17 that I will consider the meeting closed. Thank you
- 18 very much.
